

Council News

GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Australian Local Government Association sent out a Call for Motions

The Australian Local Government Association sent out a Call for Motions in January for the National General Assembly. Council met as a working party on 6 February 2019 in order to develop a range of Motions to be sent to the ALGA for consideration. After the 6 February 2019 meeting the Acting Chief Executive Officer sent out a range of motions discussed at the meeting and their supporting information. No responses to those motions have yet been received. Council resolved at the March meeting to endorse the following motions;

- Provide incentives for rural / regional Councils to create micro systems which allow for effective and efficient water storage and management systems to accommodation domestic use
- Establish a regional focus through the provision of funding models for waste management systems with an aim to develop a more entrepreneurial framework
- Provide funding and support for migrant workers with (STEM) backgrounds to expedite transition of the recognition of their skills, making them available to re-enter the workforce, with an emphasis to filling rural demands where these skills are in critical shortage
- Develop better, more effective mechanisms for medical interns to complete placements in rural areas

All motions have been submitted by the Acting Chief Executive Officer so they may be considered for debate at the National General Assembly.

Music and Wifi in the CBD of Streaky Bay

MCED has contacted Lynch Technologies and a quote has been received for inclusion in the Draft 2019/2020 Annual Business Plan as requested.

Elected Member Training Report

A report was presented by the Acting CEO outlining a proposed Annual Training Plan for Elected Members. A full list of training options was presented with Elected Members to contact the Executive Assistant and advise of the training they were wishing to attend. The A/CEO is working to arrange some training free here in Streaky Bay utilising local resources and expertise.

Community Forums 2019

Community Forums for the townships of Eba Anchorage, Perlubie, Haslam, Wirrulla, Poochera, Sceale Bay and Calca were held on Sunday 24 March 2019 at Eba Anchorage, Wirrulla and Sceale Bay. The forums were well attended with approximately 20 participants at each. A spreadsheet of issues raised is being finalised and will be presented to Council with staff outcomes/comments at the April 2019 meeting of Council. Following this it shall be published in the Criterion for the community to view.

The Streaky Bay and Piednippie forums are to be held on Sunday 14 April 2019 at the Streaky Bay Craft & Produce Market, 10.00am – 2.00pm.

Council Community and Economic Development Committee

A report was presented to the March 2019 meeting of Council to determine a future meeting date and the presiding member of the Committee. Council resolved to hold the first meeting on May 30 2019, with the presiding member to be Trudy McGowan.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Foreshore Tourist Park Development

The Capital Investment Business Agreement has been signed by the Acting Chief Executive Officer and relevant parties at Discovery Parks. This Agreement will assist in the management of the Capital Renewal Project for the remainder of the reconstruction of the Streaky Bay Foreshore Tourist Caravan Park.

The next nine new cabins have arrived, installation is expected to be completed by 11 May 2019 following the switch over to new services.

At this point we will be moving the current "executive" cabins onto new sites in line with the masterplan.

Preliminary works have begun for the residence, ensuite sites and procurement of stage 3 infrastructure per the Capital investment Business Agreement.

Foreshore Tourist Park – Debenture Loan

A report was presented to the March 2019 meeting of Council providing background information and options for Council to fund the park upgrade. Options included low interest loans, use of Council cash or a combination. Council at that meeting resolved to commence to draw down 50% of the \$5.1m loan facility with a term of 15 years, that Council had previously agreed to undertake for the Streaky Bay Foreshore Tourist Park Capital Project upgrade.

Foreshore Tourist Park Development – Funding

An application was submitted under the Building Better Regions Fund – Round 3 for the Foreshore Tourist Park Development. The application was unsuccessful.

TOURISM

Regional Trails Strategy

Regional Development Australia (WEP) will be developing a Regional Trails Strategy for the Eyre Peninsula over the next 12 months, this will be a collaborative project between Councils, RDA, Community Tourism Groups and others. As part of this project, Council will take the opportunity to review their 2011 Bicycle Plan for Streaky Bay and other trails identified within the District Management Plan. There were a number of conversations at the Community Forums regarding trails and this will provide Council with the opportunity to identify all their potential trails and develop a hierarchy of priority for funding

Gawler Ranges Road (Wirrulla to Kingoonya)

Nothing further to report at this point in time. Elected Members need to continue to lobby the development of the road through the RDA and other regional organisations

Tourism Strategy

Initial Community and Stakeholder Workshops have been undertaken. Draft document currently being prepared by consultant for delivery to May 30, 2019 Community and Economic Development Meeting.

Abalone Brand – Streaky Bay

Cr McGowan raised a question on notice requesting that Council support the brand positioning that Streaky Bay becomes the home of Abalone and that Council incorporates the abalone shell into its branding for Streaky Bay. This follows a deputation provided by Streaky Bay Tourism at the previous meeting of Council where the concept was presented to Council. A report was presented to Council at this meeting seeking Council support of the concept development and that the branding be included in Council's Tourism Strategy. Council laid the report on the table until the April 2019 meeting of Council to enable more time to consider the proposal.

Regional Branding Strategy

Regional Development Australia (WEP) will be developing a Regional Branding and Marketing Strategy for the Eyre Peninsula over the next 12 months, this will be a collaborative project between Councils, RDA, Community Tourism Groups and others.

Wayfinding, Coastal Access and Regional Camping Strategy (Eye's on Eyre Strategy) - Campgrounds

Design concepts have been completed and public consultation was undertaken by Regional Development Australia WEP in February 2019 for Tractor Beach Campground. A report was presented to Council

outlining the feedback from these meetings and Council approved the plans in principle. Negotiations for care and control of relevant land will now commence with a full report to Council in the future and the formal adoption of the concept plans for construction.

A Taste of Streaky Bay –Long Table Lunch – Fee Waiver Council, following a request from Streaky Bay Tourism agreed to provide a value of \$400 worth of photocopying expenses to Streaky Bay Tourism for the purposes of the Long Table Lunch 2019.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Australia's Biggest Morning Tea

A report was presented to Council at the March 2019 meeting proposing that the Streaky Bay Branch of the CWA take over the hosting of the Annual Australia's Biggest Morning Tea event. Council resolved at the meeting to continue the progression to have the CWA host the event in the future.

Community Information Packs – New Residents and Businesses

Cr McGowan raised a question on notice regarding the implementation of new resident and business packs. The Community and Economic Development Team will be pursuing the implementation of this in the future.

Childcare Feasibility Study

A project brief has been issued to potential consultants, a quote has been returned with a report to the April 2019 meeting of Council.

Memorial Garden – Concept and Scope

The Community Land Management Plan has been forwarded to Crown Land for comment. Once support has been obtained from Crown Lands the Community Land Management Plan will be placed out for public comment.

YOUTH

Youth Week 2019

Grant funding has been successful with monies previously allocated in the budget. Activities are now co-ordinated and booked for the April school holidays.

Digital Connections Grant

The digital animation and illustration workshops for the youth of Streaky Bay and Elliston project is underway.

Cungena Landfill Cell Design and Build

An addendum to the current Cungena Landfill Environmental Management Plan with particular focus on longer life of the landfill has been developed and lodged with the Environment Protection Authority.

Cungena Landfill Land Purchase

This process is dependent on the Barngarla Native Title Claim which still is awaiting finalisation.

Road Construction

Council has completed during 2018/2019 the following roads; Kaldoonera Road (8km), Gill Road (7km), Carawa Road (3.56km), Westall Way Loop (7kms). Staff have completed the first 3.5 kms of Calca Road which is expected to be completed prior to Easter. Once this is complete we will be moving over to Poochera/Port Kenny Road.

Road Maintenance

Patrol grading will begin again this month regardless to if we receive rain. We will be starting with the Category One and Two Roads and Category 3 and 4 roads will be considered when it starts raining. All major roads in the District have been graded once this season to date.

To date in the 2018/2019 financial year approx. 993 kms of road has been patrol graded.

Town Masterplan Review

Council had allocated funding in the 2018/2019 financial year to complete a review of the document. A report was presented to Council to consider holding the project over to the 2019/2020 financial year due to competing priorities with project completion. Council resolved at the meeting to allocate funding in the 2019/2020 financial year to allow completion of the review.

Residential (Sustainability Living Policy Area) Development Plan Amendment Statement of Intent

On the 20 March 2019 Council received a letter from the Minister advising that the Statement of Intent was not supported at this time. As such, any further requests for Development Plan Amendments will need to wait until the implementation of the new planning system which will come into effect for the District of Streaky Bay in late 2019.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Great Australian Bight Drilling – Council Position

Council voted at a Special Meeting on Friday 15 March 2019 to have no position in regards to calling for a moratorium to drilling in the Great Australian Bight. The Acting Chief Executive Officer has sent a letter to both NOPSEMA and Equinor advising them of this position. Letters regarding Council's position and including the previously received petition and supporting letters against drilling in the Bight were also sent to Mr Peter Treloar and the Honourable David Ridgway.

HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Spark For Life – International Master Course – Request for Funding – Streaky Bay Hospital

A request for co-funding to assist a staff member of the Streaky Bay Hospital to attend the spark for life master training course in Perth was received and considered by Council at the March 2019 meeting. The Course will enable the staff member to provide support to dementia sufferers through both the health system and through community groups. Council resolved at the meeting to seek further information prior to making a decision.

To prevent the abandonment or dumping of unwanted litters Council Officers will accept surrendered cats and kittens at no charge. This can be done by ringing the Council on 0886261001 and organise collection via Council's General Inspector.

Council staff will endeavour to re-home suitable, healthy surrendered animals via animal rescue groups such as the RSPCA shelter in Port Lincoln.

COMFORT AND COOKING FIRES

People can have a fire for comfort and cooking purposes as long as it is:

- ⇒ An appropriate agent to extinguish the fire is on hand.

Microchipping – It's Compulsory

From the 1st of July 2018 it became compulsory for all dogs and cats to be microchipped. This includes working dogs and all cats and dogs over the age of 3 months.

Microchips assist in returning your pet as quickly as possible and limit the number of impounded animals.

If your dog or cat is found to be not microchipped you will be subject to an expiation fee of \$170.00.

Veterinarians regularly visit Streaky Bay, and there are Council employees as well as numerous trained microchip implanters throughout the district that can provide this service.

New Dog By-Laws

The new by-laws require any person with a dog in their care and control in a public place to carry a bag or other suitable container for the collection and disposal of their dog faeces.

If you are found to be without a bag or container while you have your animal in a public place you could be liable to a \$100.00 expiation fee.

Let's keep our district and public areas clean and free of disease.

Barking Dogs

Why do dogs bark?

Most dogs make noise at some time as a way of communicating. They can be expressing excitement, boredom, stress, anxiety or defence of territory. Barking, whining and howling can be incredibly distressing for owners and their neighbours.

How can I reduce my dogs barking?

You may have noticed your dog makes excessive noise or someone has notified you. An open approach is most helpful in resolving any problems.

Firstly try to establish what is causing your dog to bark. There may be a number of causes. Here are some of the most common reasons:

- Boredom
- Anxiety
- Disturbances
- Discomfort
- Excitement
- Attention seeking

You may require a professional opinion. You can discuss any concerns with your local council animal management officer, veterinarian or seek the services of an animal behaviourist.

Once you have determined the cause, you need to commit to a strategy. This will most likely require a modification to your behaviour too. You many need to interact with your dog more, provide additional comfort, provide mental stimulation activities and toys, attend dog obedience classes, socialise your dog, attend to any medical issues and develop your understanding of dog behaviour and body language. It is important to be consistent and to reward positive behaviour.

If the problem stems from scheduled disturbances, such as end of the school day or mail delivery, you may find relocating your dog for these times resolves the problem. If there a reoccurring disturbance caused by a neighbour, have an open conversation with them about possible forewarning to prevent your dog from creating a nuisance to others or socialisation with the neighbour so the dog doesn't feel as defensive.

If your dog is home alone most of the day, you may want to enlist a friend or family member that can visit the dog and give them some attention while you are not there or if your dog is friends with your neighbour's dog, let them spend the day together. There are also many 'doggy day care' and professional dog walkers who can help to relieve the boredom of a backyard for your dog. A radio set to a talkback station can also relieve the anxiety of some lonely dogs.

Some dogs will also bark because they miss you, their main care giver, and are stressed. This is called separation anxiety. If you think that your dog may be suffering from separation anxiety, you can create an area where the dog likes to be, and feels safe without you. It could be the dog's kennel, a crate, or a small enclosed area in a laundry or shed. It is important that your dog has access to this area when you are away so that they go there in times of stress. You should feed the dog in this area and encourage them to sleep there so that the dog builds a positive association. You can also increase their resilience to your absence by leaving your dog for short periods of time (5-10 minutes) throughout the day (e.g the weekend). This will help your dog to understand that when you leave you come back and it will make you leaving and returning a normal and predictable part of their day. Further advice can be sought from your veterinary surgeon or a dog behaviourist.

Ask you neighbours for help. Discuss ways that they can support you work towards this behaviour change. Note: The use of electric shock training methods, including shock collars, is illegal in South Australia under the Animal Welfare Act.

What can I do about nuisance barking?

Barking is a natural behaviour for dogs and they are permitted to bark unless the barking is considered excessive.

If you are concerned about the level of noise a dog in your area is making, try to resolve the issue by speaking to the owner first. Many times dog owners are unaware their pet is causing a problem to their neighbours and are happy to put measures in place to reduce the barking when alerted to the issue and work with their neighbours.

If you approach them in a friendly manner you may be able to reach a solution quickly.

Barking Dogs (cont'd)

Conversely, there may be contributing factors that your neighbour may require your support in resolving, such as cats entering the property, provocation by others, startling loud noises, etc.

If the matter cannot be resolved directly with the dog's owner, you can make a formal complaint to Council who can investigate the matter with supporting evidence provided the by you, complainant.

What can council do about nuisance barking?

Each council has a procedure to respond to barking complaints.

In most instances when an official complaint has been received, the complainant will be asked to complete a seven day barking dog diary. Council will assess the

evidence of nuisance, and if applicable, approach the owner of the dog to assist in resolving the barking dog issue. The complainant will be asked to submit another seven day barking dog diary. This procedure may vary council to council.

If the dog continues to create a noise which persistently occurs or it unreasonably interferes with the peace, comfort or convenience of a person, the owner may be fined or have a Control (Barking Dog) Order placed on the dog, legally requiring them to take all reasonable steps to reduce the noise.

Unfortunately, it can take several months to resolve a problem in this way.
