GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Council Community and Economic Development Committee

The Committee held its first meeting on 23 May 2019, the meeting discussed a number of reports with statistics relating to the Visitor Economy; Draft Tourism Strategy; Streaky Bay Marketing Campaign, Committee Strategic Directions.

Equinor – Exploration Drilling in the Great Australian Bight

Cr McGowan raised a question on notice regarding Council's wish to negotiate compensation for the community in regards to the effect of drilling in the bight. Council advised that Council did not at the time of its decision to not have a position wish to commence discussions with Equinor regarding a compensation agreement. (See Agenda for full statement).

Public Street Lighting – LED Lighting – SA Power Networks Proposal

SAPN will be presenting at the next EPLGA Board meeting in regards to their LED lighting project. The Chief Executive Officer is pursuing neighbouring Councils to work together to ensure viable costings are obtained for the purchase of the latest LED Lighting and to enable management of an effective roll out.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Federal Government Drought Expo, Streaky Bay, May 30

The MCED and CEO have been liaising with a representative of the Federal Government Drought Team, who are organising a state wide "road show" type event that is cross government and organisations event to provide an opportunity for affected businesses and individuals to meet with and access relevant resources relating to the effects of drought.

SEALED ROADS

Hospital Drive, Williams Cres, Flinders Drive Corner

This project has been removed from the budget following the conclusion of the first workshop held on the 16 May 2019.

Speed Hump Requests

During recent community forums requests were received regarding the installation of speed humps to the townships of Sceale Bay, Haslam, Perlubie Landing and Eba Anchorage. Council resolved at the April 2019 meeting to undertake community consultation to receive feedback on the proposed installation of the speed humps. Council moved a further motion at the May meeting of Council to include a reduction of speed to 25kmh as part of this process.

UNSEALED ROADS

Road Construction

Council has completed during 2018/2019 the following roads; Kaldoonera Road (8km), Gill Road (7km), Carawa Road (3.56km), Westall Way Loop (7kms), Calca Road (7km). Staff have completed the first 1 km of Poochera Port Kenny Road. Once this is complete we will be moving over to the Kingoonya-Yantanabie Road

Road Maintenance

Patrol grading - To date in the 2018/2019 financial year approx. 1217kms of road has been patrol graded.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Wells Street – PLEC Project

SA Power Networks were on site in the past few weeks and the project has been delayed whilst SAPN review the plans and consider contracting their portion of the work.

Council News Cont'd

Streaky Bay Aerodrome (Airport)

Cr Pudney raised a question with notice regarding the funding avenues for upgrading the Streaky Bay Aerodrome for the purposes of increasing the districts economic prosperity. MDS will prepare a report to the 20 June 2019 meeting outlining funding options and review of the Aerodrome Masterplan.

Streaky Bay Sports Complex – Entrance of Wells Street.

The lighting of the access to the Streaky Bay Sports Complex has been raised with concerns cited over poor visibility being a risk/hazard to users. A quote for lighting was prepared for budget consideration and at the workshop held 16 May 2019 it was deferred pending the Wells Street Upgrade.

PLANNING & REGULATING

RSL Streaky Bay – Buffer Zone

A request from the RSL Streaky Bay branch was received requesting that Council agree to the land between the RSL and the “old Tennis Court” facility being dedicated as a “buffer” zone between the two parcels of land. Council resolved at the May 2019 meeting of Council to advise the RSL that there is currently no plans for the development of the site or removal of vegetation between the RSL and the existing driveway. Should this change they will be notified as part of any future plan development.

ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

Starling Control

A letter was prepared for the Mayor to sign regarding the starling issue and has been forwarded to relevant Ministers for action. Further follow up and lobbying will occur in the coming months.

Baird Bay Township Coastal Wall

Site survey to be undertaken, quotes for future protection of Baird Bay from storm surges and rising sea levels have been sought from engineers so a design can be developed for the renewal of the levee bank that currently protects the township. It is hoped the report will be received in June 2019.

Council Office Solar System

A solar system has been installed onto the main Council building at Alfred Terrace, Streaky Bay.

HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Spark For Life – International Master Course – Request for Funding – Streaky Bay Hospital

Council have agreed to fund \$5,000 of the cost of the ‘Spark for Life’ conference attendance for Chris Boylan. This amount will be paid once Chris has completed the training.

Streaky Bay and District Medical Clinic

Council have budgeted for a \$50,000 loan to be made to the Medical Clinic to allow for its continuation. Further discussions with the Board will be requested should further funding be required.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Speed Hump Installation

Community consultation has closed for feedback regarding the installation of Speed Humps in small townships. The data shall be collated and presented to the June 2019 meeting of Council.

Finlayson Road Intersection Upgrade

Community consultation has closed for feedback regarding the Finlayson Road Intersection Upgrade. The data shall be collated and presented to the June 2019 meeting of Council.

MEET THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER Karina Ewer

The District Council of Streaky Bay welcomes Karina Ewer as Council’s newly appointed Chief Executive Officer.

Karina was previously employed as the Manager, Corporate Services with Council, prior to stepping into the role as Acting, CEO followed by her appointment.

We touched base with Karina to provide a little insight into her desire to be Chief Executive Officer.

*Karina, where did you previously reside and what attracted you to the **Position** of Manager, Corporate Services initially?*

Previously 27 years in Townsville, Queensland. I was attracted to the position initially for the challenge it presented me and the chance to fully use my qualifications. Once I got here for the interview though I was pretty much in love with Streaky Bay.

In your time spent in Townsville briefly explain what was your previous employment and experience?

I have had so many roles. I worked for 8 years in various roles with the Department of Natural Resources and Mines in positions such as Executive Assistant to the Regional Director, Project Officer in the Abandoned Mine Land Program and Asset Manager for the Natural Resources Team. I did a year’s contract work in Human Resources developing

policies and procedures for Sun Metals (a Korean owned Zinc Refinery) and 15 years in Queensland Ambulance Service where I managed the Registered Training Organisation and most recently before coming here, held the position of Senior Human Resource Consultant.

Upon your move to Streaky Bay what were the stand out highlights of the region, the district and our townships in your first 6 months?

So much. The beauty of the natural environment is the huge stand out for me and the lifestyle offered by the community itself. The challenges have been very exciting, everything from considering water sustainability for the future to developing human resource management systems within the Council. No two days are ever the same...and the sunsets and sunrises are to die for.

What inspired you to step up to the role of Chief Executive Officer?

Am I able to say if you don't ask the answer is always no? I felt I could value add for Council and the community in this position and actually put in place some of the skills and knowledge I have gained from working in such diverse areas. The Senior Staff are an inspiring team to work with and their dedication to the District is a credit to each of them. Who wouldn't want to work with them? The staff in general should also be commended. Everyone is always up for a challenge and the team always manages to deliver a broad range of services within very tight budgets and always with consideration for their community. I am very honoured to be chosen as the CEO and I believe I am little more than a reflection of the team I work with every day.

What do you think the 3 biggest challenges for Council will be in the next 3 years?

I think the two biggest challenges for us will be to find solutions for sustainable water and electricity supply because without those two important infrastructure assets in place, we cannot grow. I also think attracting specific visitor demographics to the area will allow us to capitalise on the natural beauty of this place without compromising what makes it beautiful – finding that balance will be our third largest challenge going forward.

What do you think the 3 biggest opportunities for Council will be in the next 3 years?

In no particular order because they are all related to each other. 1. A committed business community; who are committed to sustainable growth, which we are starting to experience, will mean we have the opportunity to carefully and thoughtfully grow our businesses to attract others to the area. Agribusiness remains the core of the community and working with those businesses as well will mean we can help everyone to find new and innovative ways to enhance their businesses and sustainably manage their growth. 2. Digital connectivity - If we can get that right in the next few years then the districts amazing businesses and people can become competitive across the State, Country and World – depending on what they want to achieve. 3. A passionate community – who are proud of what they have and what they have achieved and more importantly what is possible for the future.

What do you believe is Council's (and or the Districts) biggest asset that will help us overcome those challenges and realise our opportunities?

The skill and dedication of your Council and Councillors and the commitment of the community to maintaining what is uniquely Streaky. Those are the biggest assets of Streaky Bay. All the people who love the place and want it to be more without compromising what it already is.

What do you find the most exciting, challenging or rewarding working for Local Government?

All at once it is managing the budget and delivering all of the things Federal and State Government require of every Council and meeting the needs and aspirations of our communities. It is a difficult balance. We have quite a small budget to work with considering our deliverables and that all adds layers of complexity.

It is incredibly challenging. What is exciting about that though are the ways in which we innovate to deliver quality outcomes – take the drought funding. Those were projects Council could not have afforded for some time and we have had to be very innovative in the ways we have delivered within what will end up being a four month timeframe. We are always looking for the things we **can** do and finding those innovative answers is extremely rewarding. Working with community groups and external providers to deliver everything from information sessions to building and maintaining roads or finding solutions to such abstract things as our electricity supply or advocating to get a doctor is all at once challenging, exciting, exhausting and rewarding.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON COUNCIL'S DRAFT ANNUAL BUSINESS PLAN 2019/2020

The District Council of Streaky Bay has released its **Draft Annual Business Plan 2019/2020** for **public comment** from **Thursday 6 June to 5.00pm Thursday 27 June 2019** to assist in determining the priorities, in particular the proposed new and upgraded capital projects and operational new initiatives for the coming financial year.

The projects, programs and services proposed in the Draft Annual Business Plan are to be funded with an increase in rates revenue as follows:

- Overall rate increase of 3%
(comprising 2% rate rise plus 1% to cover ongoing support for the medical clinic)
- CWMS Levy no increase
- Waste Levy no increase

Council has budgeted for an operating deficit of \$196,386, which is an improvement on 2018/2019, where Council had budgeted an operating deficit of \$773,475. Although, Council has budgeted for an operating deficit, over the last 5 years, Council has generally delivered an operating surplus.

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Council has budgeted for a lending of \$ 657,056, indicating Council is funding asset maintenance and asset upgrades from their Cash Reserves, or they will be required to undertake further borrowings. Council has indicated their intention to borrow for the Streaky Bay Foreshore Tourist Park Capital Upgrade, which equates to a \$5.1m spend, for a period of 5 years.

Spendmapp compiles and analyses bank transaction data by time, geography, expenditure category and type allowing continuous monitoring and analysis of local economic activity.

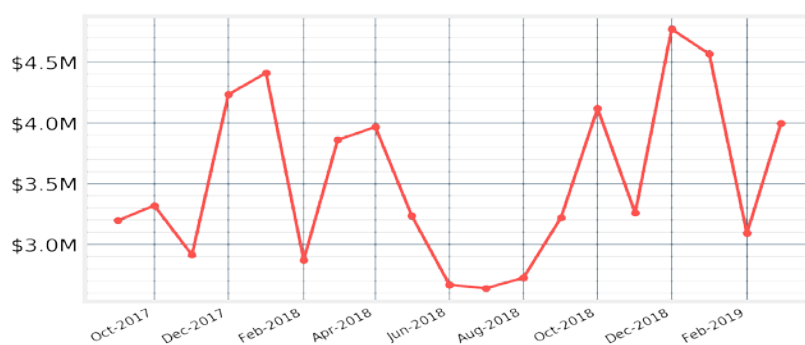
For the month of March, 2019:

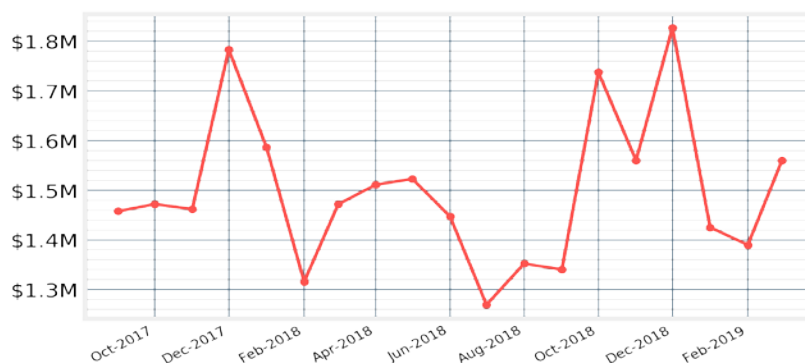
Total Local Spend

The total amount spent with merchants within your LGA.



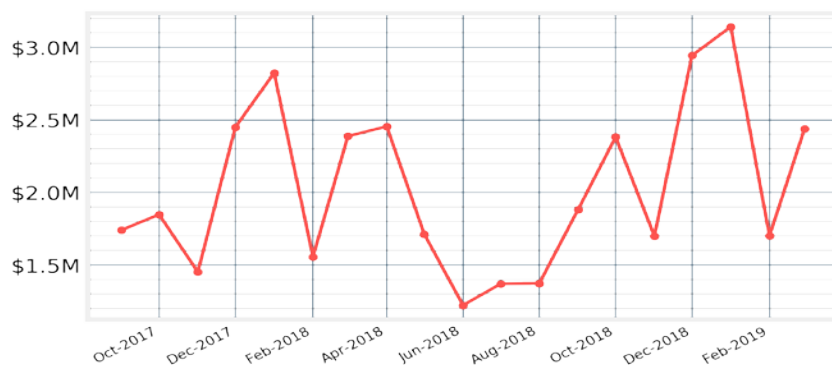
Resident Local Spend

The amount spent by your residents with merchants inside your LGA.



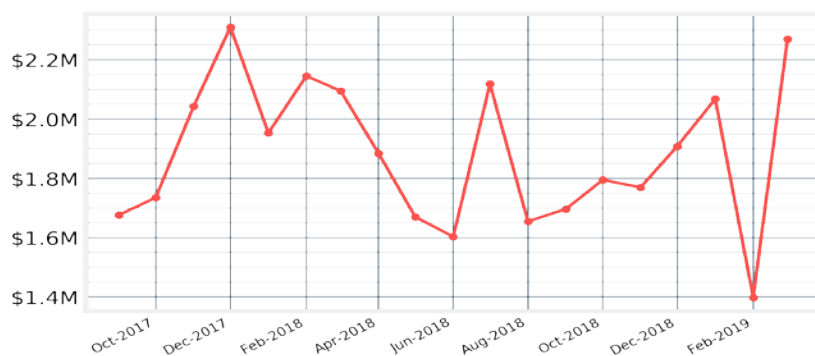
Visitor Local Spend

The amount spent by non-residents of your LGA with merchants inside your LGA.



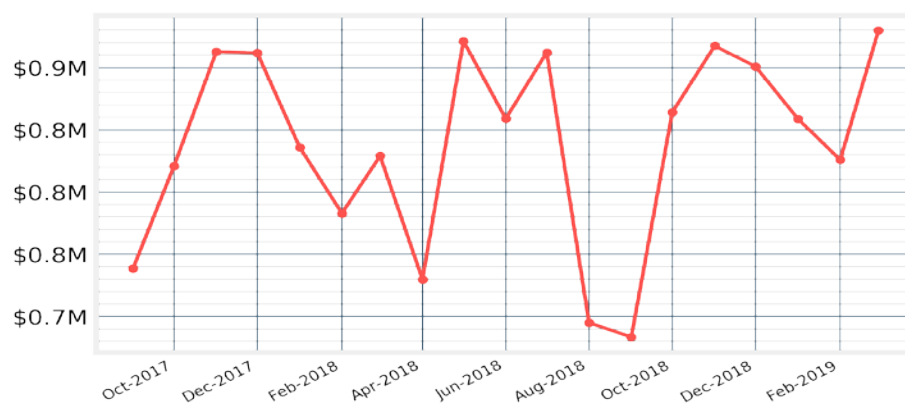
Resident Escape Spend

COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF CATS

At its April Council meeting, Council voted to introduce compulsory registration of owned cats for a fee of \$5.00 for desexed and \$10 undesexed cats starting 1 July 2019.

Cats are able to be registered online for a 12 month period via the Dogs and Cats Online portal (DACO), which is the same online site for dogs.

Registration fees will help Council to effectively manage the general cat population.

There are hundreds of feral and semi-owned cats (cats that rely on food from a variety of people but have no particular home or owner), that are left to roam, spread disease, breed, fight, marking their territory through urinating and generally causing a nuisance to residents.

Wandering cats are also a major factor contributing to many barking dog issues, particularly barking throughout the night, that Council regularly deals with.

Having your cat microchipped does not mean your cat is registered.
