# **Council News**

# GOVERNANCE

#### Covid 19

The main Council Office (Alfred Terrace) has resumed operations to business as usual, the Visitor Centre will remain at its current operating hours being 9am - 2pm.

#### Council Office Lift Installation

The installation of a lift for the Main Council Office has gone out for Tender, no tenders were received and the current tender is currently being reassessed.

# Surveillance Policy Implementation

Council has budgeted this financial year to install surveillance systems on some of Council's assets. As part of the roll out of this, a policy was developed to ensure that; there is a provision of a safe environment, compliance with the requirements of the relevant legislation and associated directions and providing an explanation to employees, contractors, visitors and volunteers the circumstances when workplace surveillance will be undertaken.

#### Generators Main Office

Specifications pertaining to generator requirements have been received. These will be utilised to develop Tender documents and tenders are expected to be released the first week of March 2022.

# INFRASTRUCTURE

#### Significant Rainfall Event

On the night of the 20 and 21 January, 2022 the community in areas received in excess of 100mm of rainfall. The rainfall saw localised flash flooding and there was significant areas of water pooling. In summary the damage to Council assets was;

- No damage to sealed road network
- 20% of damaged to our unsealed road network with 10% requiring significant work
- Jessie Flat Road, Cape Bauer Rd requires resheeting
- Westall Loop significant work
- Baird Bay Road
- Some damage to Wirrulla Sporting Reserve Club Rooms

Council officers are assessing whether a claim for funding be submitted via the SA Local Government Disaster Recovery Assistance Program.

# Woolamai Way Perlubie

Previously council officers met with resident of the Perlubie to discuss traffic management issues associated with the entrance road.

From that meeting improved signage, including speed and directional signage was installed, and traffic counters were put in place.

Residents have since reported that the signage has been effective in providing adequate direction to the beach. In addition to this prior to the speed signage being installed traffic counter data revealed that only 15% of vehicles were adhering to the speed limit that has since increased to 21%, though this % is still very low for a built-up area.

# Streaky Bay Street Tree Maintenance

The Council had recently engaged a local contractor to undertake further removals and pruning to street trees throughout the district.

Council Officers and local pest specialist have been working on undertaking testing for pest and disease in the dying and affected trees. The first test came back negative for the condition the trees were thought to be suffering, additional tests have arrived and further testing will be undertaken across the township.

# Patrol Grading

February saw us finish grading the tourist roads along with some roads affected by the recent heavy rainfall. Plus, sections of Yantanabie Rd, Chilpenunda Rd, Piednippie-Marryvale Rd, Jessie Flat Road and Dog Fence Rd. Council has completed some reactive work which was undertaken by contractors.

#### Road Construction

Council completed construction of Cape Bauer Loop (Andersons Rd to Hally's Carpark).

The road construction team has moved to Poochera-Port Kenny Road (Inkster Road to Conglima Road).

# Streaky Bay Dental Clinic New Chair

Council in its support for the provision of medical services for residents, leases the premises and equipment to a private provider for the purpose of delivering dental services to the community.

Some of the current equipment within the building has become quite aged, and Council recently considered and endorsed the purchase of a new dental chair for the facility.

# Volunteer Management Policy – Reviewed

Council recognises the place and importance that volunteers can play to develop and strengthen the links between council and their communities.

The Policy outlines Council's expectations and management of the volunteers it utilises for its various activities.

#### Criterion Production Review

Council officers have been seeking to review areas where potential cost savings can be achieved. The Criterion Newsletter production was recently reviewed and a report with options presented to Council.

The Criterion was originally estimated to cost Council \$3193 per month (including wages and income received) when being internally printed. Council officers sought to streamline this process and outsource the labour-intensive internal printing to external printing which bought the costs down to \$1911 per month.

Council were provided with alternative options including regular use of the EP Advocate and resolved to continue the printing of the Criterion as is.

#### Streaky Bay Presenters Group

Lazaro Numa is a virtuoso Cuban trumpeter who will be visiting Streaky Bay on Friday, April 2022 (mark this one in your diaries!). Lazaro will be accompanied by 4 other artists who will perform 4 x 20-minute live music segments, it will be an upbeat event that audiences will love!

# Youth Week – April 2022

# Sixteen Legs Exhibition – Outcomes

Despite this the exhibition was still a success and provided an opportunity that otherwise our community would not experience. # Streaky Bay Foreshore Tourist Park Development

Western Amenities – quotes have been received and contractor will be engaged to provide an upgrade of the functionality and aesthetics of the amenities.

Eastern Amenities – design concept has been approved and awaiting Discovery Parks approval.

Wash Down Bay - a wash down bay has been developed and installed at the park.

# Tractor Beach Campground Development

The Tractor Beach campground (old site) will be closed for a period of time commencing this week.

The closure will enable council works staff to undertake minor remedial works and rehabilitation to those site areas. These works will also include additional access management.

# Streaky Bay Youth Precinct

Council have endorsed additional funding to be applied to the precinct project.

This will enable a greater level of landscaping and sundry items to fully develop the precinct area.

Council officers will be seeking community input into final design plans in the coming months.

# Community Strengthening, Planning and Development Committee

Council's Section 41 reconvened last week for the first time in 12 months, after it was finally able to secure its second independent member.

# Mobile Food Van Vending Policy

Prior to September 2021 Councils were required to grant a permit under Section 222 of the Local Government Act for the use of a road for mobile food vending businesses.

As part of the state government led local government reform in 2021, Section 222(1a) of the Act (and associated regulations) has been deleted, removing the requirement to issue a permit to a mobile food vending business.

Therefore, it now becomes a matter for discretion of each council whether to issue a permit under the act and whether to continue to have in place location rules.

A detailed report was presented to Council at the February ordinary meeting of Council and at that meeting Council resolved to continue the practice of issuing permits and for the existing location rules to remain in place.

# Regional Branding Review – Seafood Frontier

The Eyre Peninsula Local Government association and Regional Development Australia EP have committed funds to undertaking a review of the existing brand for the Eyre Peninsula, its effectiveness and its current relevance. An update will be provided as this project develops.

Planning and Development Snapshot

January 2021 – February 2022 Total Approvals – 63

22 of those were detached dwellings/single storey/villas, the estimated value of those 22 applications was submitted as \$6.2m, with a value range between \$30k-\$990k, the average value per approval being \$285k.

In addition to this were Section 7 and Section 187 searches undertaken by Council on behalf of persons who have acquired a relevant interest in land situated within Council boundaries was 229 over this 13-month period (17 per month).

This further indicates the current and expected growth the district is experiencing, and Council will begin to consider and develop strategies to support the services required during this growth period.

# CEO UPDATE

From the CEO's desk

As many of you are aware, throughout the township of Streaky Bay there are several trees which have died or are currently struggling. Regarding this issue, I wanted to provide the community with a brief update about how Council is addressing the issue.

Council Officers have been aware of this issue and are investigating the causes of it. One of the areas being explored is whether this issue is because of a plant -based disease. The reason why this has been identified as being a possible cause is that the issue is isolated to certain varieties of trees in various locations across the township. We are investigating this possible cause through working with an arborist and undertaking tests on the trees which have been affected, interestingly these tests are called rapid antigen tests (just like the COVID tests). As this is specialised testing, this is taking some time due to obtaining the rapid antigen tests.

Outside of disease, there are several avenues which Council is exploring, including:

- The age of the trees
- Recent rainfall levels and how that has affected the trees
- The appropriateness of the variety of the trees in terms of climate, acknowledging that climate change is leading to dryer and hotter weather

One option we have drawn a line through is that the issue occurred due to over-spray from Council staff. The reason why we have ruled this option out is because:

- The issue is occurring in a variety of locations across Streaky Bay
- The issue is occurring to specific varieties of trees
- The type and ratios of chemicals being used to spray weeds wouldn't kill an established tree
- Council has several processes in place to ensure the safe spraying of chemicals while maintaining parks, gardens, and roadside verges

In terms of the replanting of trees which have died. Council will need to completely rule out that disease is the cause and ensure an appropriate variety of tree is selected as a replacement. Otherwise, the issues which have occurred will continue.

# Native Title Updates

#### FAR WEST COAST SEA CLAIM

The Far West Coast Sea Claim covers all the land and waters within the boundary of the intersection of the State border of South Australia and Western Australia at the low water mark of the coastline; then generally easterly along that low water mark of the coastline to the easternmost point of Cape Bauer; then south westerly seaward to the 3 Nautical Miles Limit boundary (from the Territorial Sea Baseline); then generally westerly along that 3 Nautical Mile Limit boundary to a point due south of the commencement point; then north back to the commencement point.

The application excludes any land and waters subject to:

i. Native Title Determination SAD 6008/119 Far West Coast as determined in the

Federal Court of Australia on 5 December 2013; and

ii. Native Title Determination Application SAD6019/1998 Wirangu No. 2 Part A Native title Claim.

This is an important Native Title claim for not only these commercial fishing licence holders but also as a potential precedent for other sea country claims in South Australia. There are another 12 sea country claims that are likely to be affected by this claim and some of the other claims take in much larger areas of sea beyond the low water mark; in many respects this matter is significant in South Australia.

# WIRANGU NO 2 PART A AND PART B CLAIM

The Wirangu No 2 native title claim was split into two discrete native title claims by the Federal Court, subsequent to the filing and registration of the Nauo No 3 native title claim.

The two claims are the Wirangu No 2 Part A native title claim and Wirangu No 2 Part B native title claim. The Wirangu No Part B claim area overlaps with the Nauo No 3 claim area, covering a portion of the West Coast of South Australia, north of Elliston, extending through to Streaky Bay and including coastal areas and bays.

# Wirangu No 2 Part A (Non-overlapping area)

The area of the Wirangu No 2 native title claim that is not overlapping is the Wirangu No 2 Part A. The Federal Court is dealing with this native title claim in a separate proceeding.

# Wirangu No 2 Part B / Nauo No 3 (Overlapping area)

Wirangu No 2 Part B and Nauo No 3 native title claims overlap and the court is progressing these claims jointly.

The State has been engaged in the tenure extraction work. The tenure assessment and analysis has been completed and provided to respondent parties for consideration. Negotiations on tenure status is completed. The State obtained counsel opinion on proceeding towards settlement by consent determination.

# WIRANGU NO 3 CLAIM

This is a new native title claim by the Wirangu People, filed in the Federal Court on 28 October 2019. The claimants are the same group in the Wirangu No 2 native title claim.

This claim is being made in relation to exclusive possession where it is recognised, over the claim area which represents parcels of land under ss 47, 47A and 47B, that have reverted back to unalienated Crown land. Wirangu people are claiming the right to possess, occupy, use and enjoy the lands and waters upon these additional areas.

At an Administrative Listing on 25 November 2019, the Registrar determined that the Wirangu No 3 native title application, be separated into two parts to be called "Wirangu No 3 Part A" and "Wirangu No 3 Part B" respectively. Wirangu No 3 Part A is to comprise that portion of the area claimed which is not overlapped by the application by the Nauo No 3. Wirangu No 3 Part B will comprise the balance of the area. Wirangu No 3 Part B, Wirangu No 2 Part B and Nauo No 3 is be dealt with in the same proceeding. Progress in Wirangu No 3 Part B has been gathered up in the proposed consent determination reported in the Wirangu No 2 Part B claim above.

# WIRANGU SEA CLAIM NO 2

This is a new claim which was initially filed in January 2021 by the Wirangu People. The claim was named the Wirangu No 4 Sea Claim Native Title Claim. The claim area followed the coastline in the Wirangu No 2 native title claim to 300 meters seaward. There is significant sea country involved in this claim. However the Applicants subsequently informed the court that there was an error in the claim area map. On this basis the Court made orders for the claim to be withdrawn and a fresh claim lodged.

# Native Title Updates

The Wirangu Sea Claim No 2 was filed in the Federal Court on 18 May 2021. In June the Court made orders for the Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 native title application be separated into two parts to be called "Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 Part A" and "Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 Part B" respectively. Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 Part A is to comprise that portion of the area claimed which is not overlapped by the Nauo No. 3 application. Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 Part B is to comprise the balance of the area which is overlapped by the Nauo No. 3 claim

Further, the Court made orders for all issues in the Wirangu Sea Claim No. 2 Part B application to be heard and determined in the one trial together with the Nauo/Wirangu proceedings. As indicated earlier in this report, these proceedings are moving towards resolution by consent determination.

# LOOKING TO UNDERTAKE ADVERTISING IN THE DISTRICT?

The installation of roadside signage is an Alternation to a Public Road in accordance with Section 221 of the *Local Government Act 1999* and therefore requires the approval of Council.

The Department of Infrastructure and Transport are responsible for the management of State arterial roads and are responsible for the assessment of requests for the installation of signage on these roadsides.

# **Temporary Signs**

The District Council of Streaky Bay support the placement of Temporary Signs which announce a local **event** in the nature of:

- Religious (imparting of religious beliefs through slogans not accepted),
- educational,
- cultural.
- social; or
- recreation
- Signage in the form of trailer advertisement require approval by Council resolution

# Not accepted;

• imparting of Political advocacy or items of political nature will not be accepted, election signage is excluded from this

These types of signs include those that are commonly placed at the Alfred Terrace/Bay Road T-Junction in Streaky Bay. In addition to this there is criteria around materials, size, condition, proposed location that will also be considered in the application process.

# Real Estate Signage

Does not require approval unless it is located on Local Government Land (e.g. footpath, road verge, road reserve or other local government land) if located on Local Government land then a permit is required.

# **Building Work Signs**

An advertisement display may be erected without approval on land on which building work is being lawfully undertaken permitting the advertisement display;

- contains information that refers to the work being undertaken;
- is not more than 3m2in area;
- does not move, ort flash, and is not illuminated; and
- does not reflect light to be an undue distraction to motorists

# Commercial Signs on Residential Premises

A sign on residential land without prior Development Approval cannot be erected. Only identification signs, which identify the address of the property on which it is situated are permitted. The identification sign cannot identify or advertise business or business activity.



# Commercial Signs on Non-Residential Buildings

Signage displayed on buildings used primarily for retail, commercial, office or business purposes does not require Development Approval, permitting the advertising display:

- is located on the front wall of the building; and sits flush on the front of the building;
- does not move, flash, or create an undue distraction to motorists; and is not internally illuminated;
- is not attached to the fascia of a verandah; and / or
- if there is no verandah the signage should not be more than 3.7m above ground level

# Commercial Signage on Council Roadsides

The Council does not permit the installation of commercial advertising signage within roadsides, with the exception of fingerboards (see Clause 5.8).

Applications for commercial advertising utilising fingerboards within road reserves shall require approval under Section 221 of the *Local Government Act 1999* and an application form must be completed accordingly.

# Commercial Signage on other Local Government Land

Commercial signage may be permitted at designated information bays, those bays being;

- Poochera Museum
- Sceale Bay Shelter
- Streaky Bay Lions Park

The installation of such signage shall be subject to and application, permit provided and an annual fee paid by the signage owner. The sign shall be removed should such fee not be paid within three (3) months of the start of any financial year.

# Non – Commercial Signage on Council Roadsides and other Local Government Land

Signage that is considered to be of wider community interest, such as entrance signage, community facilities, directional signage to visitor services and major attractions will be considered on a case by case basis.

Applications for installation of direction signage to visitor attractions and services will be assessed against the criteria of the Road Sign Guidelines – Guide to Visitor and Services Road Signs in SA, published by the SA Tourism Commission and Department of Infrastructure and Transport.

# Precinct Advertisement Displays

Precinct Advertisement Displays listing individual businesses as "cluster" may be installed at the entrance to a recognised estate, where there is an incorporated association or body that represents that estate and this body takes the responsibility for the sign.

#### Moveable (A Frame Signs)

All A Frame moveable signs require a permit and authorisation by Council. There are certain parameters that are required to be met in terms of assessment including location, size, materials, condition, etc.

#### What is a food business?

Under the Food Act 2001 a **food business** means a business, enterprise or activity (other than a primary food production business)

- the handling of food intended for sale
- the sale of food

regardless of whether the business, enterprise or activity concerned is of a **commercial**, **charitable or community nature** or whether it involves the handling or sale of food on one occasion only.

Food business even includes businesses like the following: chemists, cinemas, corner stores, petrol stations and swimming pools. All food businesses, from major food manufacturers to a local church group that holds a one-off food fair, have **defined responsibilities under the legislation to ensure the safety of food**.

# Food Business Notification Requirements

Before starting food handling operations all food businesses operating within the district are required to formally notify Council.

# What does Council Require

When starting a mobile food van business or to commence operating in the Council district you will need to:

- 1. Review Council's Mobile Food Vending Fact Sheet
- 2. Check where you are permitted to operate by reviewing the Mobile Food Vending Policy
- 3. Complete and ensure you have your Food Business Notification Number (see above)
- 4. Complete and Submit the Mobile Food Vending Application Form

Please ensure that you submit your Mobile Food Vending Application Form at least seven (7) days prior to your proposed operating start date.



# **GREAT WHITE KAOLIN PROJECT**

Andromeda is developing the Great White Kaolin Project, located 15km southwest of Poochera. The mining operation to extract and refine bright white halloysite-kaolin clay is expected to create up to 75 direct jobs and add a significant economic boost to the region over a 26-year Life of Mine.

Mining tenements for the Great White Kaolin Project were granted on 17 December 2021. These include Mining Lease (ML) 6532 over the Great White Deposit and Miscellaneous Purposes Licence (MPL) 163 for a water pipeline supporting operations and MPL 164 for an access road from Poochera – Port Kenny Road to the ML.

Andromeda's focus is now on the second stage of approvals under the South Australian mining tenement system, the preparation of the Program for Environmental Protection and Rehabilitation (PEPR). In compiling the information for the PEPR, Andromeda will explain its operational plan for the Project. Andromeda will also show how compliance with the outcome criteria specified with the grant of the mining tenements will be achieved and measured.





# Regional Event Fund

The Regional Event Fund is designed to strengthen the state's regional events calendar and drive economic stimulus across the regions beyond the traditionally peak summer tourism period. The South Australian Government recognises the huge impact that COVID-19 has had on the events sector in South Australia.

The Regional Event Fund aims to:

- strengthen the regional events calendar
- drive regional visitation in the immediate term and lead to repeat visitation
- increase event specific visitor expenditure, particularly from interstate
- assist in COVID-19 recovery recognising that events provide a vibrant and positive social environment for communities
- promote a year-round calendar of regional events
- encourage sustainable event opportunities to build long term capability
- increase collaboration and partnerships among regional event stakeholders, government and commercial partners to deliver stronger outcomes for regional events.

There are four categories in the Regional Event Fund:

- Significant Event Funding
- Established Event Funding
- Development Event Funding
- Emerging Event Funding

Applicants can seek funding from \$5,000 to more than \$50,000 (excluding GST).

The 2022/23 Regional Event Fund will support events held between 1 September 2022 and 30 August 2023. Applications for Round 1 of the Regional Event Fund will close on Friday, 22 April 2022 at 5:00pm.

#### Bite-sized Grants

Funding of between \$200 and \$1000 is available for community groups and not-for-profit organisations for small, short-term projects.

# Major Events Support Grant

A Major Events Support Grant of up to \$25,000 is available for the operators of major one-off events impacted by the health-related trading restrictions. These include major public events in South Australia, organisations will need to provide proof of non-recoverable financial loss - this grant is not industry specific.

To be eligible for the grant a business must:

- have a valid and active ABN (Australian Business Number) and be registered for the GST.
- have an Australia-wide payroll of less than \$10 million in the 2019-20 or 2020-21 financial year.
- employ people in South Australia.
- be the organiser/operator of an event scheduled over the period from 27 December 2021 and 31 March 2022, which was required to be cancelled/postponed.
- the event was a one-off event with an approved COVID Management Plan or COVID Safe Plan catering for an event of over 1,000 combined capacity in one or across multiple locations.
- entities with an on-going COVID-19 Management/Safe Plan for regularly scheduled events are not eligible.
- have incurred a non-recoverable financial loss as a result of the cancellation or postponement of the event.

To receive the full \$25,000 grant, organisers must have experienced a non-recoverable loss that was greater than \$25,000.

# Support for businesses, jobs & the community impacted by COVID-19


The South Australian Government has introduced a support package for businesses impacted by the health restrictions put in place from 27 December 2021. More details at: treasury.sa.gov.au.

Tourism, hospitality and gym grant - turnover based payment- \$3,000 for employing businesses or \$1,000 for non-employing businesses. Additional \$7,000 for tourism, hospitality and other eligible businesses with turnover above \$2 million. Additional top up equivalent to automatic payment for businesses that did not receive the automatic payment

Business hardship grant - \$6,000 for employing \$2,000 businesses or for non-employing businesses.

*Major events grant -* Up to \$100,000 for organisers of cancelled or postponed major public events.

Applications close midnight 31 March 2022. COVID-19 Business Hardship Grant Grants of \$6,000 available for employing businesses with annual payrolls below \$10 million and \$2,000 for non-employing businesses who have experienced a minimum 50 per cent reduction in turnover over the eligible period.


