STORM WATER MANAGEMENT PLAN CONSULTATION

Save the Date

Water Technology has been engaged by the District Council of Streaky Bay (DCSB) to provide review and update of the existing Streaky Bay Stormwater Management Plan (SMP), finalised in 2011. In the decade since it's development, changes to both the landscape and community priorities have occurred, along with significant advancements in data availability and hydraulic modelling capabilities.

An updated SMP will address the changed needs of the community and stakeholders, provide an opportunity for alignment with other strategic documents (i.e. the District Management Plan and Streaky Bay Township Masterplan), and set the priorities for management actions over the short to medium timeframe. The scope of this project was identified in the proposal as to:

- Build on the previous work and existing documentation regarding stormwater management
- Engage with stakeholders and the community to develop a long-term vision for stormwater management in the region, and to identify existing risks and potential opportunities
- Document existing stormwater management strategies
- Identify appropriate, fit for purpose upgrades and/or new management strategies, with associated costings and priorities so that they can be implemented when funds become available.

MOORE'S BOAT RAMP PERMITS

A permit is required to launch or retrieve boats and watercraft from Moore's Boat Ramp. Failure to purchase a current period permit may result in the issue of an expiation notice. The expiation fee is currently \$210. Please note that purchasing a permit after being notified that a valid permit was not displayed on the towing vehicle will not suffice to avoid an expiation notice.

For annual permit holders the 2023/24 permit must now be displayed. These are yellow. Please be advised that the 2022/23 annual permits (blue), and any other prior year annual permit, have expired and do not constitute a valid permit to avoid an expiation notice.

All permits can be obtained from The District Council of Streaky Bay Principal Office at 29 Alfred Terrace, the Visitor Centre at 21 Bay Road or Killa's, Streaky Bay at 48 Wells Street.

CEO UPDATE

I note recent media coverage regarding a feasibility study being undertaken for a possible medical, community and business hub. As the CEO of Council, I believe in fostering transparent communication and community engagement. So, in this month's column, I would like to shed light on a crucial aspect of our decision-making process that often involves various projects and initiatives - a feasibility study.

What is a Feasibility Study?

BENEFITS OF OWNING A PET

The Health Boosting Benefits of Pets

Most pet owners are clear about the immediate joys that come with sharing their lives with companion animals. However, many of us remain unaware of the physical and mental health benefits that can also accompany the pleasure of snuggling up to a furry friend.

It's only recently that studies have begun to scientifically explore the benefits of the human-animal bond. And while it's true that people with pets often experience greater health benefits than those without, a pet doesn't necessarily have to be a dog or a cat.

Studies have shown that:

- Pet owners are less likely to suffer from depression than those without pets.
- People with pets have lower blood pressure in stressful situations than those without pets.
- Playing with a dog, cat or other pet can elevate levels of serotonin and dopamine, which calm and relax.
- Pet owners have lower triglyceride and cholesterol levels (indicators of heart disease) than those without pets.
- Heart attack patients with pets survive longer than those without.
- Pet owners over age 65 make 30 percent fewer visits to their doctors than those without pets.

The companionship of a pet can also ease loneliness and most dogs are a great stimulus for healthy exercise, which can substantially boost your mood and ease depression.

EP LANDSCAPE BOARD UPDATE



The District Council of Streaky Bay in conjunction with the Eyre Peninsula Landscape Board are implementing measures for the management and control of this pest plant.

Background

Gazania sp. are a perennial herb supporting daisy flowers of white, yellow, orange, purple, and red colourings and green glossy topped leaves with blue-green fury undersides. They form mat-like colonies commonly on disturbed grounds such as roadsides. Originally from South Africa this garden escapee thrives in our climate and is drought tolerant. It is widespread in many coastal townships and is particularly destructive in coastal dunes and amongst roadside vegetation where it can exclude all other plants. It is also recently being recognised by landholders as a difficult weed to control once established on farming land.

Gazanias are very tolerant to fire, frost, salinity and drought. Outside their natural range Gazanias can rapidly out-compete native plants, leading to a decline in biodiversity. Gazania is a declared plant under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019 and its sale or transport is prohibited throughout the whole of the state of South Australia.

Management and Control

Physical

For effective control, the entire plant, including its root system, should be dug out. Minimal disturbance techniques should be employed. Plants should be removed and correctly disposed of to ensure flowers do not go to seed or the roots re-establish. In situations where the plant cannot be removed, flower heads should be taken off before setting seed. This will prevent the further spread of seed. A minimal level of control is to mow or brush cut the flowers before they develop and set seed.

Herbicides

The Weed Control Handbook for Declared Plants in South Australia offers advice on suitable herbicides and rates. A copy of the handbook is available at www.pir.sa.gov.au. There is also a Weed Control Phone App available for Android and iPhones.

EP LANDSCAPE BOARD UPDATE - CONTINUED

Landholders should always read the label of any herbicide to ensure it is suitable for its intended purpose and can be used safely. Care should be taken to avoid herbicide contact with native plants and any spraying of herbicide in native vegetation should be left to qualified bushcare operators.

Timing

Control is most effective when the plant is actively growing between June to November. This can be defined as having new lush foliage and flowering. Don't spray when the plant is visibly under stress.

How you can you help?

Landholders and residents are encouraged to remove gazania plants from their properties with the aim of containing the spread in the local area and on the Eyre Peninsula.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice

Your vote will decide if some words will be added to the Australian Constitution.

The words would recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the first peoples of Australia. The words would mean that a body called the 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice' will be set up.



What the Voice would do

The Voice would be set up in line with some principles. These were agreed between a First Nations Referendum Working Group, made up of First Nations leaders from across Australia, and the

The Voice would be separate to the Government. But the group would give important advice to:

- the Government

The Voice would speak on issues that affect the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

The Voice members would make sure everyone knows what they are doing and saying.

The Voice would work with groups and organisations that are already in place.



How the Voice would be set up

First Nations people would choose who is in the Voice. They would base this choice on what they want for their communities.

Members would be from a mix of:

- denders

places

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures

The Voice would:

- empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community voices be led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities
 - value all views and voices
- be informed by culture
- include young people.



Voting in the referendum

f you're an Australian citizen and older than 18 years, you:

- must be on the electoral roll

At the referendum, you will be asked to vote either 'yes' or 'no' to adding the words to the Constitution.

- The referendum will pass if both of these happen:
- · most voters in at least 4 out of 6 states vote yes
 - most voters in Australia vote yes.

After the referendum

if the referendum passes, the Government will talk with:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities
 - the Parliament

These conversations would help to set up the Voice. The Parliament would then make a law to set up the Voice.




