Council News

ANNUAL BUSINESS PLAN & BUDGET

Council endorsed its Annual Business Plan and Budget for 2023/2024 at the June 2023 Ordinary meeting of Council.

The endorsement of the Annual Business Plan includes the adoption of;

- Rating Policy
- Rate Rebate Policy
- Valuations
- Residential Rate Cap
- Rate Declaration
- Fees and Charges

INFRASTRUCTURE

Foreshore Lawn Scarifying

In April Council took to undertake a heavy scarifying of the lawns along the Foreshore and RSL. Whilst the lawns looked a little worse for wear for the first week or so, it is great to see them a couple of months down the track looking healthy, green and vibrant.

Lions Park Project Development

The Lions Park project developed has commenced the demolition stage. This will continue over the coming weeks and will be followed by site set out and level establishment before new work installation commences. We ask the public from now on to please refrain from entering the site.

Native Bushfood Garden Funding

Council Officers applied for funding to support the development of a Native Bushfood Garden in the Pioneers (Lions Park).

The project will include a co-design process with local indigenous persons, facilitated between EP Landscape Board staff and Council Officers. The detail of plant selection, planting, signage and signage details will be undertaken through the co-design process.

Bushfoods tell the story of Indigenous Australian's connection to country and raise awareness of the history and cultural use of the plants to non-indigenous people. Australian Indigenous people have lived sustainably for over 60,000 years using Native Foods for a variety of purposes including consumption and have had a symbiotic relationship with the land and lived off the native flora and fauna for many generations.

Bush tucker is any food that is native to Australia. The plants are naturally adapted to the climate and soil of the environment, meaning they need less

water and less effort to maintain when grown in similar conditions. The incorporation of this into the recreation facility will educate and encourage people to incorporate similar elements into their home gardens and better understand the multiple uses of native foods.

Alternate Dump Point Locations

A report was presented to the April 2023 Ordinary meeting of Council providing for opportunity to select for further investigation locations for a second dump point within the township of Streaky Bay, 8 separate locations were put forward for consideration (see full report for details). Council endorsed the existing RV Park for the installation of the second dump point, this will assist in alleviating current pressures of the Pioneers Park location.

Depot Office Transportable

Council committed to and have had installed additional demountable office buildings at the Streaky Bay Depot. The additional office space will enable the Infrastructure Management Team of Council to relocate from the Main Office to the Depot, this will enable better efficiencies and management of the department.

Council Office Lift Installation

The Lift installation to the Main Council Office has been completed. This will enable the Council Chambers to be moved back to its original location within the Main Council Office Building. The lift is a legislative requirement within the Local Government Act as Council Meetings must be able to be accessible by all persons. The lift itself is located within the Council Chamber room, with entry from the front foyer of Council. Supporting works such as painting, and carpeting and minor construction works are continuing.

REGULATORY AND DEVELOPMENT

Dog and Cat Management Plan

In April Council endorsed a new Animal Management Plan for 2023-2028, this plan included new on leash areas, the Plan Development and endorsement is a requirement of the Dog and Cat Management Act, a copy of the plan is available on Council's website www.streakybay.sa.gov.au.

Animal Management

Since 1 July 2022, Council staff have responded to 28 complaints or reports, relating to dogs wandering at large, harassment on Animals, cat, and rooster complaints.

Staff have started to monitor on leash and off leash areas and will be advocating to the dog owners their responsibility of owning a dog, by undertaking the following:

- A dog bag dispenser to be installed at Back Beach

- Signage to be displayed, at some key areas – Back Beach, Surfers
- Visitation to the area
- Owner responsibility pamphlets to be left on windscreens of users at these area

Food Handling Safety and Inspections

Council recently engaged a consultant (due to no Environmental Health Officer on staff) to undertake routine required inspections of businesses and facilities that undertake food handling activities. This included a community/business workshop held at the Community Complex to assist community groups and businesses understand their responsibilities under the Food Safety Act.

TOURISM AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Eyre's Waterhole Overnight Camping

Council Officer's understand that there have been complaints received regarding both the number of and environmental degradation (in particular human health issues) that is occurring at the Eyre's Waterhole overnight camping location on Flinders Highway, 5km East of the Township.

The overnight rest stop does not have public amenities or waste bins located at the site. Inspections by Council Officers have noted between 15-20 mostly (non-self-contained) vehicles camping at the location some nights. In addition to this a site visit was undertaken last week that revealed both unsightly and un-hygienic human waste in unacceptable amounts around the perimeter of the park, along the walkway to and at the historical water hole site.

In a follow-up to the inspection photographic evidence along with a request for proposed action has been forwarded to Crown Land and the Department of Infrastructure and Transport. Whilst Council is responsible for the land directly behind the site, and the Aboriginal Lands Trust for the well site, it is the behaviour of and the utilisation of the rest stop that is causing the litter and human health concerns for both the other parties.

RAA Electric Vehicle Charge Network

Construction by the RAA's contractor Chargefox has commenced in January 2023 with outer Adelaide, the Hills and South East first as part of the roll out. Council's across the EP have now signed agreements with a view to installation by mid 2024, Streaky Bay will be locating a fast charge station as part of this project at the Kiosk Carpark along Wells Street, due to this location meeting the requirements of location specifics.

Eyre Peninsula Monopoly Board

The design and content of the board game has been finalised and the board game is currently being printed. The board game will be sold via the visitor information centre and once all the units have been sold the project will have covered its design costs and made a slight profit. If a reprint of the game is undertaken, this is where Council will see a greater return on its investment. However, the main benefits of the project are encouraging collaboration between the EP Councils and the promotion of our region.

RDA EP / SATC Regional Branding Review – Seafood Frontier

The Eyre Peninsula has released a new brand for the region's tourism marketing. It was launched in March 2023 and will be used for tourism related marketing in place of the "Seafood Frontier" brand.

Township Entrance Statements – Streaky Bay – Final Concepts and Development Approval

Following the public consultation period and general concept endorsement by Council, the engineering drawings and development application process has commenced.

Adelaide Guitar Festival

The Adelaide Guitar Festival once again was hosted in Streaky Bay on Sunday, July 2, at the Streaky Bay Hotel and the Streaky Bay Hall, both locations were well attended and feedback from those that attended was that it was a fantastic day/night. Guests were able to listen to the amazing Stephanie Strings in the Hall and move across for dinner and to be entertained by "the Burger Joint" duo at the Streaky Bay Hotel.

EP Desalination Plant Project

Council received a deputation from SA Water regarding the potential installation of desalination plant at Port Lincoln, this was followed by a community information session for the community. More information is available on their website.

Ceduna to Streaky Bay Bus Service

Council endorsed at the May meeting of Council for a motion to be put forward by the EPLGA to undertake a feasibility study that explores the reinstatement of a bus service between Ceduna and Port Lincoln, that will include Streaky Bay en-route.

Bendigo Bank Meeting

Council Officers met with a representative from the Bendigo Bank in Port Lincoln to discuss opportunities for a branch to be established in Streaky Bay. A number of options were discussed with further market research to be undertaken, Council Officers will continue to liaise with representatives on the matter.

NBN Co. Meeting

Council Officers met with NBN Co state representative in late April 2023, which was productive and provided Council Officers with an insight into NBN Co's current status and future plans. Key items from this meeting included; The Streaky Bay District has the ability to host 482 satellite connections (at 20% capacity) and 764 fixed wireless connections (at 42% capacity). NBN Co have committed \$750 million to upgrade its infrastructure across the nation, this will include Streaky Bay. These upgrades include increasing speeds from approximately 50 Mbps to 225 Mbps and increasing tower reach from 15km to 28km. This increase in tower reach will take some users off satellite connections, which will have benefits for the existing satellite users. It is not anticipated that Streaky Bay will receive this upgrade for at least 12 months and Council Officers will keep communications going with NBN Co state representative as there will be some disruptions to service delivery during the upgrades.

NBN Co. also have available a Community Ambassador Program where officers conduct community information sessions on; in home optimisation, cyber security, satellite truck supply (for emergency services satellite hubs), in addition to these representatives are interested in providing a deputation to Council and Council Officers will seek to co-ordinate the provision of the Ambassador program and deputation in the coming months.

Mobile Food Van Vendor Policy Review

Council Officers are currently undertaking a review of the Mobile Food Van Vendor Policy in accordance with the Policy Review Schedule, a draft of that Policy was presented to the Community Strengthening Planning Committee in June, with a further review with additional information to be presented back in August.

Advertising and Movable Sign Policy Reviews

Council Officers reviewed both the fixed advertising and movable signs policy in line with the review schedule, there were no recommendations for amendments to this policy.

SA Power Networks – Customer Consultative Panel – Expert Witness Participation

The General Manager of the Prosperity Unit (GMP) has been invited to attend the presentation on the final report in July 2023.

On the 24 May 2023 Council Officers and Elected Members were provided with the opportunity to meet with the new CEO of SA Power Networks in Streaky Bay, this provided the opportunity for all those participating to discuss and raise issues and opportunities within the region. It was positive to hear the CEO speak about opportunities for increased community partnerships for localised solutions and a desire to see legislative change that further facilitated these opportunities.

Township/District Management Review

The CEO and GMP attended stakeholder meetings in Adelaide to discuss the masterplan sessions, these stakeholders included SA Power Networks, SA Water, Department for Infrastructure and Transport, SA Tourism Commission, Planning and Land Use Services, Wellbeing SA, Future Urban, SA Planning and the CEO of the Office for Regional Housing. This was a good opportunity for key service providers to discuss potential issues, provide details on assets or items that may need to be included in the proposed planning.

Council received positive feedback from all attendants and thanked Council for the opportunity to have early insight into where the Council will be seeking to head in regard to the process.

Council Officers due to the Haslam session being washed out attended Haslam on the 3 May 2023, this session was very well attended, and Council Officers received some really good feedback.

The GMP will be meeting with the consultants to discuss the next phases of the project, this will include presentation of a report on the last round of consultation, Elected Member workshops, Final Round of Community Consultations and seeking to have the documents endorsed by November 2023.

Streaky Bay Connectivity Project

The GMP and CEO have been working with Field Solutions and KPMG who are applying to the Federal Regional Connectivity Program (RCP 3) for additional infrastructure that will improve connectivity within the District Council of Streaky Bay. Representatives from Field Solution will be providing a detailed deputation to Elected Members at this meeting.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Request to Develop Housing for GPs in the Eyre Peninsula

Regional Development Australia Eyre Peninsula, Norther Eyre Peninsula Health Alliance and EPLGA attended a Health Roundtable attended by representatives of these organisations, along with Joanne Quigley (Cummins Health Forum Chair), Julie Marron (EFNLHN rep for Minister for Health), Peta Rutherford (Rural Doctors Australia), Pat Giddings (RVTS Representative), Matt Williams (head of Workforce Division of the Australian Government Department of Health), SA Senator Karen Grogan (rep for Australian Govt Health Minister Mr Mark Butler).

Key outcomes of the Roundtable were;

- Recognition of the research underpinning the proposal as being solid with some agreed updates to align with potential funding sources.
- Exploring State Government collaboration through the recently announced Office of Regional Housing and local regional councils.
- Continued promotion and attraction strategies.
- Continued collaboration by all three spheres of government.

Local Drug and Alcohol Community Action Plan

The Community Development Team submitted and was successful in gaining funding under the CAP plan to host the following activities over the next 12 months:

- 3 Movie Nights (1 for Streaky Bay , 1 for Poochera & 1 for Wirrulla)
- Outdoor Games Day
- Gymnastics/Circus Workshops
- Martial Arts Workshops
- Silent Disco
- Art Workshops
- Skating Clinic and Competition

Times and dates of these events will be advertised accordingly.

Australian Early Childhood Development Census Meeting

Following on from the Wellbeing SA Round Table meeting in Adelaide those that attended were provided with a link and opportunity to meet with representatives from AEDC. The data provided by

AEDC indicated that aligned with our decline in early childhood services we are seeing an increase in risk of early childhood development declining in our communities. Council Officers met with representatives to discuss our current issues and briefly touched on the data, later in the year we will be co-ordinating a collaborative visit with AEDC, Wellbeing SA and LGA Wellbeing and Public Health representatives to begin to discuss ways in which can identify strategies to ensure our young people's developmental requirements are being met.

Health, Business and Community Hub Feasibility Study

Council considered a report at the July ordinary meeting of Council proposing a future proposal for a community hub to be located within Streaky Bay. The Community Hub would consider a 20 year future, and predicted population growth, and provide a facility to house allied health professionals (currently there is limited capacity), medical centre (current facility outdated and limited GP numbers), business and study hub (uni hubs are available throughout the rest of the state). Council endorsed additional funding to undertake Stage 2 of the Study to develop a business case, the business case does not commit council to spending on construction, but enables Council to consider construction costs, income streams, and investment opportunities.

Fringe Festival Opportunities

The Community Development Supervisor (CDS) had a meeting with Fringe Artist & Venue Team Coordinators Lee and Aaron and discussed the 2023 process for travelling fringe artists. Lee will be undertaking a regional visit to meet with hosts and check out venues/landscapes etc to assist in planning for next year. There is a mix of travelling artists from gymnasts/magicians/musicals/comedians and musicians. The CD team will put an EOI in the July Criterion for and community groups interested in being involved in the 2023 Fringe Event to attend the Regional Visit scheduled for Wednesday 26 July 2023. The CDS will continue to work with coordinators to attempt to secure shows for our District.

SUSTAINABILITY

Robinson Basin Lens

Council at the April 2023 meeting received a deputation from the Streaky Bay Golf Club/Streaky Bay District Community Complex regarding water security and future use of the Robins Lens Basin.

Council have engaged a consultant to provide a report on the ability for Council in the future to utilise water from the basin in the future if required, and explore if it is possible to recharge the basin using stormwater catchment.

CEO UPDATE

From the CEO's desk: Strategic planning

These plans include the Waste Management Strategy, Stormwater Management Strategy, Asset Management Plan and Township Master Plans. community, leading to innovative solutions and stronger community buy-in.

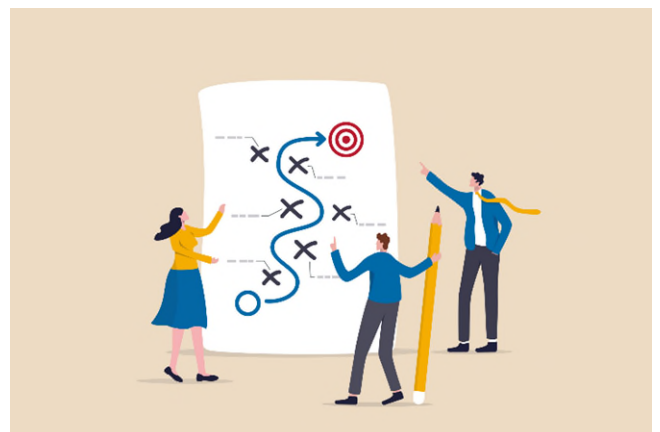
4. Adapting to Change:

WASTE MATTERS

STRATEGIC DIRECTION

Developing a waste management strategy for the Council's activities at the local and regional level is crucial to ensure efficient resource utilization, address growing waste challenges, and promote long-term environmental sustainability. Regarding this Council is currently developing its waste management strategy and is working with all of the Council's across the Eyre Peninsula to develop an Eyre Peninsula regional waste strategy. The following is an update on the development of these two strategies:

Waste Management Strategy

Council Officers and waste consultants undertook site visits during the week of 29-2 June 2023. Council Officers and the waste consultants met with EP Recycling to get feedback on current kerbside collection services, this was followed by site Visits to the Streaky Bay Transfer Station and Cungenah Landfill Site. The following day Officers travelled to Ceduna and undertook a site visit to the Ceduna Recycling Centre and Landfill site and then a collaborative meeting between CEO's and Waste Officers from Streaky Bay, Ceduna, Wudinna, and Elliston met to discuss current operations and future opportunities.

The waste consultants will now collate all the information gained from the onsite visits and meetings to provide a background information report for review. Prior to the completion of the report the General Manager of Prosperity will be meeting with the waste consultants to discuss the outcomes of the site visits and how the report should be presented.

Eyre Peninsula Waste Management Strategy

The EPLGA hosted a second workshop in Port Lincoln on May 8, 2023, the results to date were discussed and the feedback report from that meeting is yet to be distributed.

STREAKY BAY TRANSFER STATION

Green Waste Area Closure and Fees

As per EPA requirements, the Green Waste area will be closed from general public entry on the 1 August 2023, all residents will be required to then dispose of green waste via the times of the transfer station opening, fees will now apply, to green waste disposal, greenwaste previously was free of charge as it was used for landfill closure, this is no longer required and significant costs are incurred for shredding and disposal of greenwaste.

Cardboard Fees

A new fee structure is now applied to cardboard disposal to make it consistent with the fee structure for other loads of waste, please see the fee structure below. Cardboard to be accepted free of charge MUST be cut from 500mm to 500mm.

Abusive and Aggressive Customers

Council Officers have received over the past few months an increase in reports of both aggressive and abusive customers at the transfer station. This abuse has generally been driven by operational staff requesting customers to sort waste, CDL cans/bottles or the refusal of certain wastes which are all fair and reasonable requests and relate to site compliance, it has been disappointing that some of this was from Community Groups.

In recent visits to other regional and metro facilities, all these sites, have required the equivalent of or a higher level of sorting of waste or CDL prior to presentation at the site. The Ceduna CDL facility requires all cans, glass bottles, plastic bottles, and milk cartons to be separated, straws removed, and bottle tops removed prior to depositing, CDL attendants do not assist residents to do this, this was the same for other facilities demonstrating that this is a reasonable expectation at such facilities.

Council Officers when undertaking site visits regularly see high levels of contamination occurring at the site, this causes inefficiencies in handling, additional costs (particularly at shredding time) and most importantly non-compliance and have instructed staff to be more vigilant around this to ensure our compliance.

Site Security

Due to the ongoing abuse over the past few months a review of the site was undertaken from the perspective of ensuring staff safety, particularly in the light that at times staff are working alone. The results of this review have included the installation of CCTV cameras, ensuring staff have emergency contact mechanisms, and that staff can place themselves in a secure location in the event of an abusive/aggressive situation.

Soft Furnishings and C&D Waste

Both of these waste streams we have seen an increase in quantity of receipt over the past 12 months, a recent report provided by the Waste Contractor indicated from December 2022 to April 2023 the following m3 of waste have been transport to Cungenah (total 1740m3);

- 1636 m3 of Soft Furnishings
- 104 m3 of C & D Waste

FEES AND CHARGES

Fees and Charges have been reviewed to further recoup the cost of processing (shredding and transport) of items such as green waste and timber, and other fees and charges have been streamlined to have consistent charges.

SORT YOUR LOAD

Before your next trip to the transfer station, think about how you can save yourself and time and effort by sorting your load at home.

By sorting your materials it will make it easier for you to move from bay to bay and recycle as much of your waste as possible. Sorting your load will ensure you don't just throw everything into the general waste which may save you money.

Make sure you secure your load with net, ropes or tie down straps to ensure you don't litter on the way to the resource recovery centre. You can be fined for littering if waste items from your load are blown onto the road or roadside area.

How exciting to begin to see dreams become a reality! Council is excited to see the progress of this project, as with every project we've had to make some slight changes but all in all its looking amazing! The skate park section is nearing completion and the nature play space and recreational areas have commenced.

The nature play space was developed through the local Arts Up emerging artists who participated in an experience in artistic production, knowledge, and skills development during artistic residencies at the Streaky Bay Skate Park precinct during Autumn of 2021. STREAKY BAY STREET TREE UPDATE

WHAT WORK HAVE WE BEEN DOING AND WILL BE DOING?

Street Tree Assessments have been completed for the entire Streaky Bay township including the Foreshore Tourist Park. With these site inspections having included a risk assessment of the existing trees around the township.

Council at the July 2023 ordinary meeting will undertake a workshop with the consulting arborist to discuss the outcomes of the assessments on existing trees and consider future tree planting. At the August 2023 ordinary meeting, Council will review Council's existing Tree Management Policy.

A community drop-in session will be held (see details below), for members of the general public to come in and discuss concerns, seek feedback, or ask questions around the project and street trees within the project scope.

Following this on the Wednesday, the arborists along with Council staff will be undertaking testing at key locations on soil and tree health to ensure that when Council begins legacy planting there won't be not existing problems that will cause inhibit future plantings. This is on top of the testing which Council has undertaken previously.

EP LANDSCAPE BOARD UPDATE

Pest Plants

The Board continues weed control in the region. During June the following works were undertaken:

- Boxthorn control along Sceale Bay Road, Baird Bay Road and Calca Road
- Boxthorn control along Cape Bauer crownland with support from the Department for Environment and Water
- Gazania control to halt the spread outside of the Streaky Bay township into our vulnerable coastline, vegetation communities and pastoral lands.

Feral Predator Control, Venus Bay Conservation Park

In conjunction with National Parks and Wildlife staff, the EP Landscape Board facilitated a thermal night drone trial to protect threatened species including the Hooded Plover and the Greater Bilby, from feral predators. The drone trial was a success enabling feral predators to be controlled in hard to access terrain.

NAIDOC WEEK Event, Streaky Bay

The EP Landscape Board collaborated with the District Council of Streaky Bay, the National Parks & Wildlife Service, the Streaky Bay Community Library and the Streaky Bay NAIDOC Committee to hold a Streaky Bay NAIDOC event at the RSL hall in July. Local students and community members participated in cultural activities including basket weaving, smudge stick creation and canvas painting, while younger attendees were treated to a play corner and story time.

Grant Opportunities

Heritage Agreement Grant Funding

The Native Vegetation Heritage Agreement Grant Program is now open. Grant funding is available to provide support to landowners to help manage biodiversity on their properties and may include assistance for fencing, pest plant and animal control and biodiversity monitoring.

Grants are available for works on individual Heritage Agreements or works spanning multiple Heritage Agreements. There are three tiers of grants available (GST inclusive), up to \$100,000. Grants can be for one-off activities or activities that span multiple years.

DOG OWNERSHIP IN STREAKY BAY

Maybe You Love Your Pet More Than Your Partner

All of us at the Council encourage you to keep your pets safe and well. Good for your pet, good for you and good for our community. We all love our pets. In last month's column about pets I revealed that, crazily, you could marry your dog in India.

Crazy? Think about this.

Choosing a pet over a partner is more common than you think. A new poll of 3,500 dog owners found that 4 out of 5 people think their dog's reaction to a potential partner is an important factor in determining whether or not it's a love match, and 86 percent said they would break up with someone who didn't get on with their dog. More than 16 percent of married dog owners said they would rather celebrate their dog's birthday over their spouse's. One woman went so far as to call time on a 25-year marriage after her husband asked her to choose between staying married to him or keeping their dogs. She hasn't seen or heard from him since. So how many of these get a tick?

- ☐ You say hello to your pet first when you come home (+ hugs and kisses?)
- ☐ You let rip on complimenting your pet, not your partner. ("beautiful boy", "gorgeous girl"?)
- ☐ You have more photos of your pet than your partner on your mobile.
- ☐ You tell everything to your pet (and you swear it's listening, not like your partner).
- ☐ You have a cute nickname for your pet (it's "hey you" for your partner).
- ☐ You would rather sleep next to your pet than your partner (go figure).
- ☐ You find it "really cute" when your pet snores but "disgustingly horrible" when it's your partner.
- ☐ You make your partner sit on the floor because your pet has taken over the couch.
- ☐ You will always feed your pet before your partner gets to eat.
- ☐ You miss your pet a lot more than your partner when you're away.

☐ You take out private health insurance for your pet. (Your partner can use public health like everyone else).

However, it is quite probable that your partner doesn't have to be registered, so that's a win for your partner. Not sure if that's enough of a win for me though.

SATC RECREATIONAL FISHING TOURISM STRATEGY

Have your say on our Recreational Fishing Tourism Strategy, to help SATC understand how to grow the tourism sector currently worth \$380 million a year to South Australia's visitor economy.

SA AMBULANCE

GoodSAM saves lives

South Australia has joined the global GoodSAM program which saves lives through our natural instinct to help others in a crisis.

Registered health practitioners, tertiary-level health care students and SA Ambulance Service staff can now sign up as GoodSAM responders.

GoodSAM is an alert system that uses a phone app to notify registered responders – like off-duty health professionals and first-aiders – if a cardiac arrest occurs near them.

These responders can provide CPR while an ambulance is on the way.

GoodSAM also provides details of nearby defibrillators (Automated External Defibrillators or AEDs) further improving the chances of surviving a cardiac arrest.

In South Australia, SA Ambulance Service has partnered with GoodSAM to deliver this program.

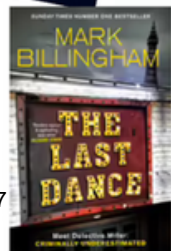
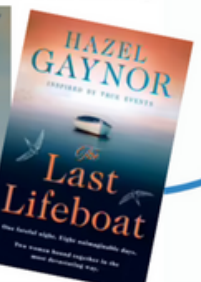

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice

In late 2023, Australians will vote in a referendum. Your vote will decide if some words will be added to the Australian Constitution. The words would recognise Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples as the first peoples of Australia. The words would mean that a body called the 'Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice' will be set up.



What the Voice would do

The Voice would be set up in line with some principles. These were agreed between a First Nations Referendum Working Group, made up of First Nations leaders from across Australia, and the Government.

The Voice would be separate to the Government. But the group would give important advice to:

- the Government
- Parliament

The Voice would speak on issues that affect the lives of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

The Voice members would make sure everyone knows what they are doing and saying.

The Voice would work with groups and organisations that are already in place.



How the Voice would be set up

First Nations people would choose who is in the Voice. They would base this choice on what they want for their communities.

Members would be from a mix of:

- genders
- places
- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures.

The Voice would:

- empower Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community voices
- be led by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities
- value all views and voices
- be informed by culture
- include young people.

Voting in the referendum

If you're an Australian citizen and older than 18 years, you:

- must be on the electoral roll
- must vote.

At the referendum, you will be asked to vote either 'yes' or 'no' to adding the words to the Constitution.

The referendum will pass if both of these happen:

- most voters in at least 4 out of 6 states vote yes
- most voters in Australia vote yes.



After the referendum

If the referendum passes, the Government will talk with:

- Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities
- the Parliament
- the public.

These conversations would help to set up the Voice. The Parliament would then make a law to set up the Voice.
