Council News

GOVERNANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Representation Review Options

Public Consultation regarding the first draft of the Representation Review has finalised with six responses being received. An Options Paper was presented to Council at the January meeting where Council resolved to essentially remain with Mayor, Wards, and number of elected members as status quo. A second report will be sent out for 3 further weeks of Public Consultation as required by the Act.

Real Estate Agents – Blancheport Development

Council received a report to the December 2020 ordinary meeting of Council regarding the expiration of agreements between Council and any real estate agents to sell Council land. Council requires the establishment of an agreement with a real estate agent to enable the sale of any of its land. The report noted that Mayor Barber is the owner of one of the proposed agents and Council resolved at the meeting to seek further legal advice to ensure that no conflict of interest exists between Mayor Barber and Council regarding this matter, that legal advice was provided, and Council endorsed both Streaky Bay Realty and Streaky Bay Eyre Peninsula Ray White to undertake sales of the relevant allotments.

BUSINESS AND ADMINISTRATION SERVICES

Boat Ramp Fees and Charges

Council received a report to the January 2021 ordinary meeting of Council to rescind a motion waiving launching fees for professional fisherman. That rescinding was endorsed and a further motion providing for fees from 1 February to 30 June was moved.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Jetty Platform Upgrade and Future

The tender for the Platform upgrade was due to close last week, however due to multiple requests from tenderers to extend the tender closing date to allow them further time to get quotes from sub-contractors the tender has been extended by a week. The project was required to go to open tender as a requirement of both State Government and Council Procurement Policies and enable transparency for contractor selection. This project is a project undertaken by Council for a State Government Asset. If you have enquiries, please contact the Infrastructure Team on (08) 86261001.

Montgomerie Terrace Shared Use Path Planning

Given the recent Wirangu Decision in relation to parts of the Golf Club, it may be necessary to utilise Bollards,

and keep the Bike Track on the edge of Montgomerie Terrace (pushed as far toward the boundary as possible). Design Drawings will be required, particularly for the Scaale Bay Rd intersection.

Overhead Standpipe – SA Water

The MICW has provided Mt Maria Drive as a potential location to SA Water, due to its proximity to the Mt Maria tanks, and their 4.5 megalitre capacity.

The MICW has had discussions with Elliston Council and is waiting on information from Ceduna Council. Ceduna installed an automated Standpipe on Highway 1 at an estimated value of \$50k, plus connection costs (TBC). Elliston Council's standpipe is infrequently used. Should removal be considered (EDC has not considered this yet), some of that infrastructure may be reusable.

Anderson Road, Gibson Peninsula – SA Water

SA Water is currently investigating design modifications to improve the water supply to residents near the Gibson Tank. MICW understanding is that SA Water are looking at increased pumping either from Mt Maria Tanks, or back from Gibson Tank. No detail has been provided to date.

Jessie Flat Road Subdivision (subdivision roads)

Works are continuing to provide access to land holders that were affected by the Streaky Bay Landfill Capping project. To date, the works have involved Rubble Carting and Grader on site.

Approximately \$75k has been expended on the project to date (Council contribution against R2R funding). A further \$100k was sought through the report to the January 2021 ordinary meeting of Council it was decided at that meeting to defer the funding until further investigation and a detailed budget was provided.

Road Construction 2020/2021

Yantanabie Road completed. Speeds Point, Point Labbatt and Baird Bay Road to be completed.

Parking

An information report and maps were presented to the January 2021 ordinary meeting of Council regarding Parking issues within the Streaky Bay Township. Options were discussed at the meeting and it was decided that Councillors further consider the options and provide feedback prior to the February 2021 ordinary meeting of Council.

- January 2021 - Poochera Museum – Gallery pathway
- Review of “Upright” Kerbing in conjunction with Stormwater Management
- Review of Intersections with “Upright” Kerbing

Robinson Basin

The MICW is currently following up with SA Water as no response to date from Crown Lands on the permit application has been received. Costing provided to date suggest that, should consent be reached, an outlay of approximately \$95k would be required to connect Robinson Basin to Wallschutzky Road catchment.

Finlayson Road Intersection with Highway

The Surveyor engaged has finished the extensive work required to finalise the documents for the Lands Titles Office. The Land acquisition can now move forward, as will discussions with DIT around coordination of works and final designs.

Designers incorrectly calculated the boundary alignment of the Roberts Road / Finlayson Road intersection. The MICW has met with the Surveyor and it was decided that the transition could be altered to avoid the Land Parcel.

West Coast Welding has recently built designated sheds for Steel fabrications and one for aluminium fabrications to stop contamination when welding, they provide customised ute tray/canopy designs for the region as well as customised Oyster Punts for the Oyster Industry.

The Rodeo by the Sea event attracted over 3000 people which improved the social and economic prosperity within the Streaky Bay Community. Rodeo by The Sea purchased and sourced supplies for the event from local retailers and service providers, boosting the local economy. Local businesses and stall holders were able to enter the event at no charge, enabling groups to improve their fundraising capabilities and for local food providers to increase profits. The event provided local businesses with sponsorship opportunities which in turn provided these businesses with social media, press, radio, tv, newspaper and advertising in the National Australian Professional Rodeo Magazine. From the profits of the event Rodeo by The Sea donated over \$4000 to the Streaky Bay Hospital and made donations to local clubs. The actual event introduced a whole new generation to the sport of rodeo with many locals having never attended a rodeo before. Many mature persons within the community had extremely fond memories of the Smoky Bay Rodeo, which ran over 30 years ago, so in Rodeo by The Sea hosting this inaugural event evoked positive memories for them.

Citizen of the Year – Joel Lynch

Joel was awarded Citizen of The Year for multiple reasons. Joel took on the role of lead contractor and site overseer of the Poochera Water Storage Drought Funding Project, Joel put in a huge number of in-kind hours on this project and without him it would not have been possible. Joel has been an active member of the Poochera CFS for at least 10 Years, has volunteered his time as the President of the Poochera Sports Complex and is constantly providing maintenance to the complex and its equipment. Joel works with the community in sowing and harvesting crops that have been sown to raise money for local community groups whilst also donating a block of land to the Western Districts Football Club to crop to raise funds for the club. Joel also runs his own business 'Cracker Jack Farming' and employees 2 people, he also runs a Hydraulic hose and fittings service which is provided to the regional community on a 24/7 on call basis.

HOLIDAY PERIOD VISITATION

It certainly was a holiday period to remember, with regional areas across the state, and not certainly just the Eyre Peninsula receiving some of their highest visitation levels in decades. It was a great time to do business in the regions and provided some well-earned relief for those industries hardest hit during the peak and ongoing restrictions associated with COVID-19.

Across the state and here in Streaky Bay it has been acknowledged we certainly did not expect the levels and type of visitation that occurred during that period. At the Visitor Centre we had to increase the staffing of the front counter to service both the visitors through the door and phone calls received, as well as keeping up with day-to-day operations.

In looking towards the future Council has been working on and identified several key issues including Waste Management, Camping (locations, litter management, coastal protection), Water, Coastal Protection (general).

Council staff held an internal meeting the second week of January, followed by a workshop with Elected Members to discuss future options. Several options have been identified and an options report will be presented to Council at the February 2021 meeting, following this meeting public consultation will be sought on the options and the financial impact of these options (where applicable).

At the State and Regional Level, I have been involved in several regional and state level forums and workshops, and there are several actions already in motion or being considered at the state level and these include (put forward by multiple LGA's).

- Waste Management (Council's picking up the cost of waste on State Roads and Reserves), increasing the funding to Council's to offset these costs.
- Waste Management – increased demand on local services
- State Level "Responsible Camping" and "Beach Usage" campaigns
- Crown Land Camping
- Appropriateness of State Level marketing of regions that do not have sufficient infrastructure in place.
- Progression of Eye's on Eyre Regional Visitor Infrastructure Strategy

I will endeavour to keep the community updated as these matters progress at the regional and state level.

On the local level, Council will be meeting with key stakeholders this week to get further feedback, and this will be followed by workshops with the retail, hospitality, and general tourism sectors to ensure that our strategies are aligned.

It was disappointing to hear and see a lot of issues being publicised on social media without first contacting local organisations. Many of these queries could have been answered or dealt with immediately had the appropriate authorities been notified, I would strongly encourage you in the first instance to contact the relevant authority, do not assume that someone else would have reported it.

Streaky Bay Boat Ramp Officially Opened

Extensive work has now been completed on the Streaky Bay Boat Launch and Retrieval Facility (Moore's Boat Ramp) which will be a huge benefit to locals and visitors to the town.

Federal Member for Grey Rowan Ramsey, who jointly opened the new facility with Mayor Travis Barber and Member for Flinders Peter Treloar, said the ramp was a "state of the art" facility and had already gained a huge tick of approval from the local professional fishing and aquaculture operators.

"The Australian Government is absolutely committed to keeping the economy ticking over through the challenges of COVID-19," Mr Ramsey said.

Part of our support has been the \$500m Local Roads and Community Infrastructure (LRCI) Program specifically designed to assist local councils to build infrastructure which will not just create jobs in the short-term, but provide long, ongoing community benefit.

In Streaky Bay's case \$493k was allocated to replace the old boat ramp with a modern, fit-for-purpose facility.

"The works include the replacement of four boat launch/retrieval ramps and two pontoon facilities, including pylons, signage and associated infrastructure and importantly, provided a boost for the local economy by supporting 30 jobs during construction," he said.

"The work on the facility is first class and I congratulate Tony Braz and his team."

The new boat ramp was strongly backed by council with a \$379k contribution and a further \$85k from the State Government.

"The boat ramp was a safety risk due to its age and was no longer considered fit-for-purpose," Mr Ramsey said. "In a town with so much focus on fishing and tourism this facility will be a great asset."

"The walkways are now safe and boats can be safely launched and then reloaded onto trailers."

The new boat ramp will support a significant fishing industry (fish, crab, oyster and abalone) and assist in maintaining the base of operations for the industry in Streaky Bay.

It will also support recreational boating, providing upgraded access to a wider range of users.

Streaky Bay Golf Course Native Title

What does Native Title Mean?

Native title is the legal recognition that some Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have rights to, and interests in, certain land because of their traditional laws and customs.

The rights granted by native title are not unlimited – they depend on the traditional laws and customs of the people claiming title. Other people's interests in, or rights to, the land are also relevant, and usually take precedence over native title.

Native title is important because dispossession and denial of land was the first act in the relationship between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and Europeans.

The *Native Title Act 1993* is important because it determines how native title interests are formally recorded and recognised. It sets the rules for dealing with land where native title still exists or may exist.

When was the Wirangu Claim Lodged?

The Wirangu people (and many other groups indigenous to South Australia) lodged their respective claims during the 1990s. For the Wirangu, their claim was made in 1998 with very little movement occurring until recently when Premier Marshall insisted claims commence assessment as natural justice was not being afforded these groups by further delaying a process that has been completed 10-15 years ago in all other States.

Why was the Golf Club Lease Not Seen as Extinguishing Native Title?

All agreements regarding the Golf Club have been held between Council and the Golf Club as Council acts on behalf of the Crown when given care and control of Crown Land.

In the case of the Golf Club, the land was held under licence (a non-exclusive possession arrangement) until 1994 at which time the Council took to move toward a lease model, primarily for the purposes of moving public liability responsibility from Council to the club, as noted in Judge Charlesworth's decision.

Judge Charlesworth has noted a number of issues and therefore has determined that no executed lease existed to extinguish Native Title (full details are available in the document on Council's Website).

There is therefore no evidence (that meets the requirements of the Evidence Act) that a lease was executed prior to 23 December 1996.

Why was the creation of the Golf Course not seen as Significant Works?

This is a little more difficult to understand and part of the reason Council decided to appeal the decision.

There are several matters Judge Charlesworth considered and these are summarised in the full document.

Appeal

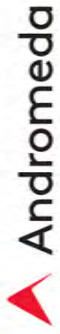
An appeal by Council has been lodged on January 15, 2021 regarding Judge Charlesworth decision. Council is currently awaiting feedback on the appeal application.

GREAT WHITE KAOLIN PROJECT

Economics of the Proposed Development

The Great White Kaolin Project is located near Poochera, on Eyre Peninsula, South Australia.

The Exploration Licence (EL 5814) is held 100% by Great Southern Kaolin Pty Ltd, a wholly owned subsidiary of ASX listed Minotaur Exploration Ltd (Minotaur; ASX: MEP).

Andromeda Metals Ltd (Andromeda; ASX: ADN) is the majority partner in a Joint Venture to advance the Proposed Development.

There are two stages proposed:

Stage 1 – Direct Shipping of Ore (DSO)

Stage 2 – On-site (wet) processing

An Ore Reserve of 12.5 million tonnes of kaolin with high brightness has been calculated from exploration drill results at the Great White Deposit. At a proposed mining rate of 500,000 tonne per year, the Proposed Development has a 26-year life-of-mine (LOM).

Additional deposits on the Eyre Peninsula (refer Figure 1) show the potential for developing additional resources into a world class kaolin region. Initial test work shows that the kaolin within these other deposits is of the same high quality as that from the Great White Deposit.

Economics

Halloysite-kaolin from the Proposed Development is ideally suited for the high-quality porcelain market. The global market for kaolin into ceramic applications is about 9 million tonnes per annum with a projected compound annual growth rate of 4% through to at least 2027.

The Proposed Development is targeting the high value end of the US\$62 billion ceramics market which is expected to reach US\$91.5 billion by 2026. China has historically produced approximately 40% of the market demand.

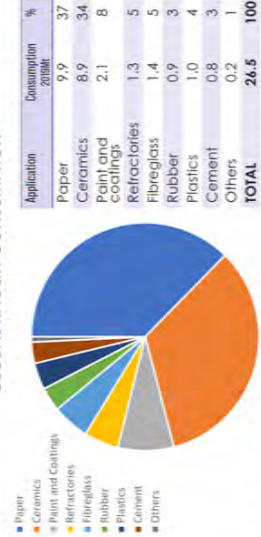


Figure 2 Percentage of markets by application (2019).

Economic Benefit

First Test Minerals, a world authority on clay materials, undertook market research and investigated project economics. This research identified high grade, halloysite-kaolin product commands a US\$500/1 value in the ceramics industry of China, throughout Asia, the Middle East, and several European countries.

The Proposed Development has:

- A 26-year life-of-mine (LOM), at the planned mining rate of 500,000 tonnes per annum.
- A pre-production capital estimate of A\$13M, with a maximum cash requirement of A\$28M prior to initial revenues being received.
- Plans for an onsite wet-processing plant and infrastructure, which will be funded by revenues received from DSO (Direct Shipping Ore) production. Commencement of construction of this plant has an estimated cost of A\$56M and would commence in the second year of operation.
- Budgeted construction capital of A\$69M for Stages One and Two.
- An estimated pre-tax cashflow of A\$1.97B, which would move through the South Australian economy over the course of the Project.
